Mission Statement

Is to provide a high standard of care and treatment for all patients referred to the hospital to enable them to achieve the optimum standard of health and independent living

Clontarf Hospital

Clontarf Hospital is a voluntary hospital providing healthcare services since 1876. The original hospital was located at 11 Usher's Island on Dublin's quays and moved to its present location on Castle Avenue, Clontarf, Dublin 3 on the 29 June 1942. The hospital provides orthopaedic and older persons rehabilitation services.

The Hospital has a capacity of 160 beds and an inpatient and outpatient non-urgent general x ray department. Our rehabilitation service is patient focused and aimed at helping people overcome the obstacles of deconditioning, frailty, illness and chronic diseases so that they can return to living independently in the Community.

Current Services:

Clontarf Hospital provides orthopaedic rehabilitation services for Beaumont Hospital, the Mater Misericordiae Hospital, Connolly Hospital Blanchardstown, St Vincent's University Hospital, Cappagh National Orthopaedic Hospital, Tallaght University Hospital and St. James's Hospital. Specific Direct Active Rehabilitation programmes for older patients are also provided for Beaumont Hospital and the Mater Misericordia University Hospital. An average of 1,300 patients are admitted annually and approximately 2,900 attend the hospital's x ray department annually.

The Hospital currently employs approximately 260 staff in the following areas:

- 1. Nursing;
- 2. Medical Social Work;
- 3. Occupational Therapy;
- 4. Physiotherapy;
- 5. Pharmacy;
- 6. Radiology;
- 7. General Administration;
- 8. Clinical Services;
- 9. Dietetics;
- 10. Catering;
- 11. General Services.

Children's First Statement

The Board, Management and Staff of Clontarf Hospital are committed to the principle that the safety and best interests of children, who are indirectly involved in our services, are paramount. These children include:

- 1. Siblings (aged less than 18 years) of patients of the hospital;
- 2. Visitors (aged less than 18 years) to the hospital whether visiting an inpatient or accompanying a patient attending an outpatient appointment;
- 3. Students (aged less than 18 years) on placement in the hospital.

The principle that the safety and best interests of children are paramount is enshrined in legislation, the Guidance documents of the Department of Children and Youth Affairs and TUSLA.

These include but are not limited to the following:

- 1. Children First Act, 2015;
- 2. National Vetting Bureau Act, 2012;
- 3. Child Care Act, 1991;
- 4. Protection for Persons Reporting Children Abuse Act, 1998.
- 5. HSE National Children First Policies

Clontarf Hospital is committed to reviewing its Child Safeguarding Statement every 2 years or sooner if required.

Risk Assessment

The Children First Act 2015 defines harm in relation to a child as "Assault, ill treatment or neglect of the child in a manner that seriously affects or is likely to seriously affect the child's health, development, or sexual abuse of the child.

The Hospital will be reviewed every two years from the date of signing or sooner if required.
